Letter from First Lady Jennie

In 2024, we celebrated Wyoming Hunger Initiative's fifth anniversary! It feels simultaneously like a lifetime away and the blink of an eye. I'm constantly amazed at what we've been able to accomplish in the last five years; we've built programs, allocated hundreds of thousands of dollars to fight hunger, built networks and relationships that enable more effective problem-solving, all while supporting the work of scores of anti-hunger organizations across the state. It wasn't so long ago that I was surprised to learn how many of our Wyoming communities experience high rates of food insecurity, but once you know the facts it's impossible to ignore the search for solutions.




Wyoming Hunger Initiative prides itself on being uniquely positioned to provide the framework and foundation for successful collaborations and solutions to hunger statewide. After a series of conversations with partners at local Wyoming Hunger Initiative Regional Summits, the John P. Ellbogen Foundation came forward with a plan this year to support and address the needs that were identified but lacked sources of funding to include utilities, rent, marketing, internships, communications, storage, and accounting assistance to name a few. The Flexible Funding dollars were intended to address one-time or extra costs or expenses facing the organizations.

After a successful pilot during the 2023 spring semester, *Beef for Backpacks* was launched statewide for the 2023-2024 school year. Thanks to the support of so many, Wyoming Hunger Initiative was able to provide over 250,000 beef sticks to weekend food bag programs statewide which directly benefited the 6,796 kids in Wyoming participating in weekend food bag program. This program was made possible thanks to 307 Meat Company, Wyoming Stock Growers Association, and the Wyoming Beef Council.

I am most proud of the partnerships we've built to develop Wyoming solutions to Wyoming challenges. Five years ago, I invited everyone in Wyoming to join me with their time, generosity, and innovative thinking to solve hunger in Wyoming. I never could have imagined the overwhelming response. It gives me hope that with each passing year, we'll grow closer to our goal of solving hunger once and for all.

Approximately 83,000 Wyoming residents struggle with food insecurity. Nearly 28,000 of those are children. Wyoming Hunger Initiative stands ready to support the grassroots efforts of every Wyoming county. Together, we can do so much more. Take a look for yourself.

FAIR TO FORK

Think a hog can't change the world? Think again.

You're never too young to join the fight against food insecurity.

Sources of high-quality protein are notoriously expensive and difficult to procure for local food pantries.

In partnership with University of Wyoming Extension 4-H, FFA, and the Hughes Charitable Foundation, *Fair to Fork* worked to purchase a non-livestock sale hog through a lottery selection, from almost every county in Wyoming. Wyoming Hunger Initiative will purchase the pig, ensure the meat is processed by a USDA or state-inspected participating facility, and then coordinate with the 4-H or FFA member to donate it to a local anti-hunger organization in the county or origin.

Providing high-quality, locally raised protein—in a portable form to kids—is a Wyoming solution to hunger.

- This program, made possible through strong partnerships, utilizes Wyoming resources to support the work of weekend food programs, making a real impact for children.
- Wyoming Hunger Initiative provided over 250,000 snack sticks through Beef for Backpacks in the first year.
- After a successful pilot in Laramie County, Beef for Backpacks was expanded statewide to meet the needs of programs in almost every Wyoming county.

Quality product, local solutions. That's the Wyoming way.

Food from the Farm + Ranch was created to utilize Wyoming agricultural products to combat food insecurity. Fresh food and sources of high-quality protein are notoriously expensive and difficult to procure for the American food bank system. Wyoming is a state of plenty, and agricultural solutions are a key element to reducing and eliminating hunger.

- Wyoming Hunger Initiative works with Wyoming Stock Growers
 Association to streamline donations that are in turn processed and
 distributed through the Wyoming Hunger Initiative regional network.
- Wyoming Hunger Initiative's regional framework is uniquely positioned to understand the need within their regions and distributes this high-quality protein based on that knowledge or per the donors request.
- Wyoming Hunger Initiative is positioned to cover the cost of processing thanks to the generosity of a multitude of donors; alternately, a donor may choose to pay for the processing before donating to Wyoming Hunger Initiative.

Increased access to fresh produce in Wyoming is a critical tool in the fight against food insecurity. *Grow a Little Extra* is helping to remove existing barriers one vegetable at a time.

This partnership between **University of Wyoming Extension**, **Cent\$ible Nutrition Program**, and the **Master Gardener** program was made possible in large part due to the generosity of Blue Cross Blue Shield of Wyoming.

You don't need special training in fighting food insecurity to make a difference. You only need to identify a need and figure out how best to help fill it. Food insecurity isn't always readily apparent, but every single Wyoming county has an army of anti-hunger heroes who are always ready to welcome new warriors to the fight. Consider this your invitation to get involved. Together, we can end hunger in Wyoming.



In 2024, **44,616** pounds of produce was donated and 29 grants were distributed, totaling **\$27,388**.

Wyoming Hunger Initiative grants are intended to support infrastructure and longevity of antihunger organizations as well as long-term, sustainable solutions to food insecurity across the state.

For the fourth year, Wyoming Hunger Initiative sold "Hearts for Hunger" during the month of February for \$5 each, proving that no matter the size of the donation, every dollar makes a difference. All funds raised were put towards infrastructure grants.

Grant funding also comes from the Wyoming Hunger Initiative Hunger *Champions Circle*, which is a team of dedicated ambassadors who serve as catalysts in the ongoing mission to end food insecurity in Wyoming.



What's more is that we know Wyoming Hunger Initiative needs to continue to exist.

Take a look at our driving strategy and goals for 2025:

- Execute the separation of Wyoming Hunger Initiative from the Wyoming Governor's Residence Foundation to include hiring an Executive Director and building an endowment that will support this work for years to come;
- Partner with local efforts to analyze and utilize the statewide "needs assessment" to identify gaps in services and opportunities for Wyoming Hunger Initiative to develop Wyoming solutions to Wyoming challenges;
- Collaborate with local and statewide partners to identify solutions to school meal debt while also working to develop strategic approaches to ensuring summer meal sites are available for children in all 23 Wyoming counties;
- Develop a statewide day of volunteering to serve as an introduction to local anti-hunger organizations while raising awareness and bringing significant support to these grassroots organizations.
